<p>Crossword—Create a crossword puzzle using your definitions as clues. Give it to a friend to solve.</p> <p>(All)</p>	<p>Etymology—Find out where your words came from. Greek? Latin? French? You will need your dictionary to find out!</p> <p>(All)</p>	<p>Poem—Write a short, two to four line rhyming poem for each word.</p> <p>(All)</p>	<p>Story words - Write a short story using all of your words.</p> <p>(All)</p>	<p>Telephone Words - Translate your words into numbers from a telephone keypad.</p> <p>(All)</p>
<p>Similar? Different?--Find 3 synonyms and 3 antonyms of your word.</p> <p>(2)</p>	<p>Make a Mnemonic—Write a sentence to help you remember your words. Each letter of the word should start a word in the sentence. For example, a mnemonic sentence for the word <i>throw</i> might be: <u>T</u>im <u>h</u>as <u>r</u>ented <u>o</u>ne <u>w</u>heelbarrow.</p> <p>(2)</p>	<p>Secret Agent Words - Number the alphabet from 1 to 26, and then convert your words to a number code. Be sure to have a friend decipher your code!</p> <p>(All)</p>	<p>Words-in-words - Write your word and then write at least 5 smaller words made from arranging the letters differently.</p> <p>(1)</p>	<p>Fraction Action—Write your spelling words as fractions based on the number of vowels and consonants in each word. Example: awful = 2/3</p> <p>(2 vowels/3 consonants)</p> <p>(All)</p>
<p>Sum it Up— Add up each spelling word. Consonants=10 points and Vowels =5</p> <p>Examples: said—10+5+5+10=30</p> <p>(All)</p>	<p>Haiku- Write a short poem using your word in some way. (Line one: 5 syllables, Line two: 7 syllables, Line 3: 5 syllables)</p> <p>(1)</p>	<p>Free Space</p>		<p>Create an activity - Can you think of a fun way to do your spelling activities? Try it out!</p> <p>(All)</p>
<p>Pyramid Words - Write your words adding or subtracting one letter at a time. The result will be a pyramid shape of words.</p> <p>(All)</p>	<p>Sentence—Can you use your words correctly? Write a sentence with each one.</p> <p>(All)</p>	<p>Catalog Item—Pretend your word is in a catalog for sale. Write a great description and describe why someone should buy your word.</p> <p>(1)</p>	<p>Haiku Comic Strip—Write a comic strip with a 5 word sentence in the first panel, a 7 word sentence in the second panel, and a five word sentence in the last panel. (You only need to use one of your word study words in this comic strip!)</p> <p>(1)</p>	<p>Sausage sentence—Write a sausage sentence using one or more of your words. (It's a meaningful string of words whose beginning and ending letters are the same. Example: (<u>T</u>ara <u>a</u>cc<u>a</u>pted <u>D</u>avid's <u>s</u>pecial <u>l</u>ilacs.)</p> <p>(1)</p>
<p>Parts of Speech—Use your dictionary to find out which part of speech your word is and write it next to your word.</p> <p>(All)</p>	<p>Color Coordinated—Write all of your words in crayon or pen. Write each consonant letter in red and each vowel in blue.</p> <p>(All)</p>	<p>Picture words - Draw a picture of your word's meaning.</p> <p>(1)</p>	<p>Syllables—Use your dictionary to find out how many syllables your word has and then divide your words correctly..</p> <p>(All)</p>	<p>Practice Makes Perfect— Write each of your words five times each.</p> <p>(All)</p>
